Designed in partnership with the University of Chicago Office of Civic Engagement and the Institute for the Formation of Knowledge, this three-day workshop is a unique opportunity to delve into the following questions:

- How can educators use the city as a classroom?
- How can place-based learning advance the civic engagement of students?
- How can inquiry skills improve learner engagement?
- What are the characteristics of deep learning (as opposed to surface and strategic learning) and how can teachers facilitate deep learning?
- How can educators design learning experiences that amplify the voices of local experts and historians in order to deepen students' interest in history?

Participants will begin and end each day at the University of Chicago. In between seminar-style discussions, participants will engage in handson sessions in the community.

This workshop will model strategies for using local resources and for incorporating "guests" and other "experts" into classes as a way to deepen inquiry and engagement. Participants will learn from and alongside Nora Brooks

Blakely (author/playwright), educator and President of Brooks Permissions) and from Patric McCoy, a noted art collector. We will also visit the Bronzeville Historical Society.

Our ultimate goal will be to explore the benefits of learner-centered pedagogical practices, including ways to make the content of a course memorable, transferable, and transformational for students.
